It has certainly been an exciting and smooth start to the school-year. The past couple of months have been incredibly busy and the progress the students have made in just a few short weeks has been astounding! Students have settled into their new classrooms, routines and getting down to the business of learning and play. The purpose of these newsletters are to provide essential information to parents and also foster a connection between home, school and the classroom. The month of October has been very busy for us here at West Stafford School. During the month of October our students participated in educational Fall themed activities. The week of October 8-14 was Fire Prevention Week. The West Stafford Fire Department visited our school, and children had an opportunity to view a fire truck, equipment, talk to firefighters and learn about fire safety. They participated in a Scavenger Hunt, Pumpkin Decorating, and Pumpkin Exploration -where they got their hands gooey and explored what they saw, felt, smelled and heard inside of a pumpkin! A huge thank you to our PTO for sponsoring this event. And lastly, on October 31st students will participate in a costume parade.


SOCIAL WORK NEWS

Greetings Families,

This school year jump starts the initiation of our new Social Emotional Learning program, RULER, developed by the Center for Emotional Intelligence at Yale University. Students have been learning about the Mood Meter (pictured) to identify their feeling zones. This is a useful tool to help students and adults Recognize how they are feeling. The next step is to Understand what caused the feeling and to Label it. Then it can be Expressed in a respectful manner and Regulation can occur. After that, one can move on with their day having solved the problem effectively, safely, and with full understanding of the situation. Students are learning strategies for helping them shift from an uncomfortable zone to a comfortable zone. Taking deep breaths, talking about the problem, taking space, and asking for a hug are a few ideas they have learned so far. You can use the Mood Meter in your home as a tool to talk about feelings and solve problems as well!

PRE-KINDERGARTEN NEWS



Since school has started we have been very busy in Pre-Kindergarten! The Pre-K students have settled in nicely.

We spent a lot of the first month of school getting to know our friends and teachers and learning routines in our school and classroom. The themes that we have talked about so far this year have been "All About Me", friends, apples, leaves and pumpkins. Some of our favorite activities have been tasting apples, creating Jock-O-Lanterns, and building things with blocks and planks. We have had the opportunity to play outside on our playscape and the blacktop area where we have an outdoor kitchen to play in..

The West Stafford fire department came for a visit and the rain held off long enough that we got to see the fire-truck up close. Thank you to the firefighters that came to teach us about fire safety. Please consider having a fire drill at home so that your child knows what your smoke detector sounds like, they know how to get out safely and where your meeting place is outside.

Please keep having your students work on putting on their coats <u>and zipping</u>! We realize that it takes a little longer for them to do this themselves when you are trying to go somewhere, but this is a life-long skill that they are more than ready to learn!

The students have been assessed on our rote skills. This assessment looks at how well we can count; both aloud and a collection of items, how many letters we can identify, colors, and shapes. We will be assessing these skills each term. Consider practicing these skills at home. You can use letter magnets to identify letters, you can count just about anything, and you can talk about shapes and colors that you see all around. Some upcoming themes we will be learning about include shapes, families, and Thanksgiving. Keep an eye on Seesaw for information about conferences toward the end of November.

From Mrs, Beaudoin's Math Desk

Making mistakes is an important part of learning. When you notice your child making a math mistake, use questioning to understand your child's thinking and help them identify their own errors.

Example-"I want to understand how you figured this out" or "Tell me about what you did"

Even when students are correct, it's a great skill to explain one's process. If kids are not making mistakes and having productive struggles, we are limiting their brain growth.


Visit <u>Math at Home</u> for some thought provoking activities and games. Activities are updated monthly. The resources are free with no login required. Resources are organized by grade level, however if you feel your child is ready for a challenge, you have access to all the elementary grades. These resources align with the Bridges program we use here at school.

KINDERGARTEN NEWS

The kindergarten team is busy implementing our Fundations® word work program. This program incorporates hands-on activities and multisensory teaching strategies to support students' early handwriting, spelling, and phonics skills. Materials and student workbooks have a model on the left **and** right so that right and left-handed children can easily see the letter they are writing. So far, students have learned the letter, sound, and keyword for the letters: a, b, c, d, e, f, g, i, m, n, o, r, s, t, and u. (For example: b, bat, /b/).

An activity that students enjoy participating in during Fundations® is using the dry erase boards. Students get to form each letting using the plane, sky, and grass lines. Sometimes we like to give students a challenge by dictating a sound or keyword and have students try to figure out which letter corresponds! It's been wonderful to see students so engaged learning each letter with our friend Echo the Owl and Baby Echo!

West Stafford School Library

"Where Stories Come Alive"

This Fall, our students have enjoyed listening to stories about Back to School ("All Are Welcome Here" by Alexandra Penfold), checking out and caring for Library books ("Manners With a Library Book"" by Amanda Doering Tourville) and the season of Autumn including apple trees ("The Apple Pie Tree" by Zoe Hall), the changing leaves ("Leaf Trouble" and "The Best Gift of All" by Jonathan Emmett), and Halloween ("Shake dem Halloween Bones" by W. Nikola Lisa and "The Little Old Lady Who Not Afraid of Anything" by Linda Williams).

Library Activities:

They've had fun experiencing hands-on activities that align with those themes and showcase their individual creativity, such as: drawing self-portraits and symmetrical apple trees, coloring paper maple leaves for our 3-D Library Tree and having fun with Halloween crafts. Our students have explored various manipulatives offered in the Library, including: Zoobs, Legos, our train table, magnetic tiles, farm animals, construction coins, a color matching game, and floor puzzles. In addition, our Science Center has opened up where our young scientists have investigated Acorns and Pinecones with magnifying glasses, all while honing their literacy and math skills. Our students always have the opportunity to read books in our Book Nook, on the couch and chairs, or on our Library rug.

Checking Out Library Books:

Our students have been excited to start checking out books from the Library. Please reinforce taking care of their library books at home and keeping their library books in a safe place where they won't lose it. Our students have a weekly Library class where they'll have the opportunity to check out books, unless their previously borrowed book has not yet been returned.

Scholastic Book Fair:



All students received their first "Star Sheet" encouraging Pre-Kindergarten students to read 10 minutes a day and Kindergarten students to read 15 minutes a day. 
EXCITING NEWS!

PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND HEALTH NEWS

Hello West Stafford School!

The beginning of the year has started off! In our PE classes we are working on rules, routines and procedures in the gym. We went over how we move around during warm ups, what the Ready Position looks like when directions are being given, and what STAR Students look like in the school and PE. Students also were taught ways to solve small problems in PE, what to do for emergencies, as well as how to enter and exit the gym.

In addition to all the learning we've done, we have also played a lot of fun games and activities. We've touched on some Spatial Awareness lessons and activities to help students know where their bodies are in relation to the gym, other students and the equipment we're using. Student's have demonstrated a lot of ways that they are able to move their bodies as well, including hopping, skipping, jumping, galloping, jogging, leaping and more.

We are entering the first lessons of our first unit, which is a cooperative games unit. Cooperative games are fun and need good communication skills in order for the students to talk to their peers to solve the problems and the games I have given them. So far the students have been doing an excellent job at talking with each other in order to work together and complete all the challenges. For Kindergarten classes, we had our first health class which consisted of learning what Health is, being safe, eating healthy, exercising, germs, and how to make and treat our friends. These are all topics to be covered throughout the rest of the year in Health.

Just a reminder to please send your children in with sneakers when they have PE! I try to stress to the students that sneakers are needed for safety when coming to PE since we do a lot of moving, so please send your child with sneakers on Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays!
